"Pacific Northwest Mennonite Historical Society seeks to collect and preserve historical materials and to celebrate the heritage of Mennonites in the Pacific Northwest in order to educate, inspire, and witness to the church and broader community."

History is simply remembering and telling stories. So with that kind of basis for preserving history we of PNMHS exist to be guardians of the Mennonite story in the Northwest. Just a reminder, that Mennonite story is bigger and wider than just one group of Mennonites!

The Heritage Center is open each week Wednesday 9 to 3 staffed by our volunteers sorting, cataloguing, and of course answering any questions that come with visitors or by email.

Approximately 75 guests came through the door in 2019 either bringing items for our keeping in an organized way or to research an interest in their genealogy or other events in the history of northwest Mennonites. I often tell folks that paper storage is not good in the basement, attic or upstairs room of your house!

Two groups of visitors were from "the east" as we say, Wisconsin and Indiana. Both were Amish and part of the Miller family tree that came to the Hibbard area and for whom a road is named nearby Zion church. Others have come with genealogy questions, for research on particular data or to borrow a book from the Center's library. There are over 3000 books on library shelves and these are also cataloged online.

June 2019 PNMHS showed John Ruth documentary "Is there a Lesson? From his many years and travels as a Mennonite historian. It was well received and we appreciated the audience and their offering shared with the documentary developers.

Looking ahead—

We have begun conversation with a large display from Kauffman Museum, Kansas, "Voices of Conscience;" a traveling exhibit telling the story of World War 1 conscientious objectors. You can be best informed by checking this online. We see 2021 as a target date and we have begun conversation with some venues for the display. Jay Beaman, Portland Mennonite is partnering with us on this project. As you explore the website you'll discover there is a substantial cost for the Society and we will work at gathering the needed funds. We understand it is an impressive display and of course the story of the historic Peace Churches.
